As we think of the message of good will brought to all the peoples of the world two thousand years ago, let us determine that we shall more than ever before, do justly, love mercy, and walk humbly every day in the year.

## THE ARCHIVES:

## A Dream Come True

■ HE ARCHIVES of The United States Jaycees: an innovative and almost unheard of idea for an organization of this kind, where continuity is a major challenge. Yet, it is an idea that has come to fruition. Today, the Archives (which is composed of both an exhibition and a library) is much more than several pieces of interesting memorabilia in a case. It is a carefully constructed and planned exhibition that will tell the history of this great organization—its members, its programs, its successes and its not-sosuccessful ventures—to anyone who visits. To tour the exhibition will be to experience the growth and changes in the organization from its beginning in 1920 through today. Not only will you see John Armbruster's trusty Oliver typewriter on which he produced the Log of the S.S. Fellowship for 47 years, but you will also find photographs of the Junior Chamber meetings in the early 30's, scrapbooks from Jaycees who made significant contributions to their communities, displays of the Jaycee programs that have aided communities in almost every imaginable way, and you will see the personal, but important parts of being a Jaycee, like pins and patches from years past.

The Director of the Smithsonian's Central Exhibits Office, James Mahoney, is working with the Foundation to design these exhibits and displays. Each will be individual and done as a complete unit within the Archives Hall. The first of these displays will be the history of our TOYM Congress and winners. This should be completed in January of 1979. We will work closely with Mahoney, our alumni, and our present membership to do all the necessary research to insure that each exhibit is correct and comprehensive.



In addition to the exhibition, we are working closely with Maynard Brichford, University of Illinois Archivist and professor of library sciences, on the establishment of a working library. This archives of the Jaycees will, when fully in service, have a complete history of the organization, protect all our original documents and papers and will insure that the present of the organization is not forgotten in a quest to preserve the past. The amount of research involved in completing an exhibit or in cataloging memorabilia is tremendous. The Foundation will know who each person in a photograph is, for example, or who the author of a manual in the 1940's was. While it is extremely time consuming, there is a reason for all of the research. We all know about the Armbrusters, the Mungenasts, the Brownfields and the Giessenbiers in the Jaycees, but we also know it is the local Jaycee member who makes this organization work. We want to be sure he, too, is portraved in the exhibition and archives. Our founders were great men and started a remarkable and unique organization, but the support and hard work of hundreds of thousands of dedicated young men are what made the Jaycees what it is today. This will be their archives.

Thanks to the tremendous support of over 800 past and present Jaycees who contributed \$130,000 in donations and pledges, we have been able to secure the services of professionals like Mahoney and Brichford to help in the design of our Archives. The finished product (although it will never be "finished" because the organization is ever growing and changing) will be something of which we will all be proud, a place where each of us will be able to see our own personal growth, struggles and successes. It will be a very personal exhibition open to the general public as well as Jaycees.

The work is ongoing. We still have some architectural changes to make in the exhibition room and the research will never be complete, so we need your continuing support. If you have memorabilia, papers, scrapbooks, or even thoughts about your Jaycee experience, please share them with us. YOU are an integral part of this organization and we need you in the exhibition and archives. Call or write to the Foundation office if you have questions or if you wonder about what you may have to send. We will be delighted to hear from you.

Both Mahoney and Birchford felt that not only would the Archives reflect the history of our organization but it will also reflect the history of our American society. Won't you be a part of it? Come and visit your exhibition and archives . . . and send us your
