And oldsters need more dependable directions. Unfortunately most medical research funding is devoted to crisis medicine - too-late and too-expensive "repair" medicine.

The overwhelming percentage of medical care costs are for the last months of life. A wag points out that a disproportionate cost of space exploration is for protective technology for astronauts, and he suggests that old characters, like us, ought to be sent into space. "They wouldn't have to bring them back," he says.

Future Publication of The Log

The US Jaycees Foundation and US Junior Chamber of Commerce have generously borne the costs of collecting information, maintaining mailing lists, writing, printing and mailing The Log since the days of Johnnie Armbruster. This continues now; but it has been proposed that The Crew assume these burdens, to free up the money to provide other services and grants to Jaycee chapters. This proposal was mentioned in the last issue of *The Log*; since then, many Mates have weighed in with their opinions and alternatives.

After reviewing the various options and considering the views expressed by all Mates who chose to participate in the discussion, it was decided that, after the March/April issue, *The Log* would be produced by The Crew at the expense of those who want to receive *The Log*. The cost per Crew member would be small, calculations indicate. An annual subscription donation of \$10 is expected to be sufficient. A subscription system also will serve to separate interested members of The Crew from persons with no continuing desire to be included, thereby saving waste. Plans are to provide them copies of The Log during their term of office. Other nominees for membership (after the 1996 Crew Reunion) should be accompanied by a check from the nominator for the nominee's subscription donation for the first year. After that time, the individual Mate should pay their subscription donation themselves.

GALS/TOYA/FOTS - what does this jumble of letters mean? Before this Jaycee year, the US Junior Chamber of Commerce held three events - Ten Outstanding Young Americans (TOYA) Awards in January (held in Tulsa), Government Affairs Leadership Seminar (GALS) in September (held in Washington, DC), and Future Officer Training School (FOTS) in March (held in Tulsa). This year, all three events are being held together in Washington, DC, from March 12-16, 1996. Most events will be held at the headquarters hotel, the Omni Shoreham.

Previously GALS each year was limited to members of the USJCC Board of Directors, where they received briefings and orientation to the federal government. This year, GALS is open to anyone who wants to attend. GALS sessions will be held on the mornings of Wednesday and Thursday, March 13 & 14, with visits to Congress, a rally, and a Congressional reception also being held the afternoon and evening of Wednesday, March 13.

TOYA activities will take place the evening of Thursday, March 14. The TOYA Banquet will be held at the Omni Shoreham Hotel from 6:00 pm to 7:30 pm, followed by the TOYA Ceremony at Constitution Hall from 8:00 pm to 10:30 pm.

On Friday, March 15, a new event will take place at the Omni Shoreham Hotel called Business Day. Business Day will provide attendees with seminars on negotiation, marketing, and starting a small business. Awards earned by Jaycee state organizations will be presented during Friday's Award Luncheon.

Then, FOTS will be held on Saturday, March 16. FOTS provides training to people anticipating running for state or national Jaycee office for next year. While previously FOTS concentrated on future State Presidents and National Vice Presidents, this year it will include training for Region and District Directors and Statewide Vice Presidents.

Also adopted by the World Congress delegates is a document called JCI Vision 2000, reprinted below. This document contains proposals developed by the JCI Strategic Planning Committee, chaired by Past JCI President Albert Hiribarrondo.

JCI VISION 2000 - THE WORLD IN THE YEAR 2000

1. That 100 National Organizations be electronically linked.

Individual Development:

- 2. That all the activities of the organization be oriented to develop the potential and skills of the individual member.
- 3. That new training programs be offered at each level local, national and international to enhance the contemporary communication techniques and business skills of the individual member.
- 4. That Associate status be offered to current members when they reach the age of 41.

Management Opportunities:

- 5. That the minimum chapter membership be 25 members.
- 6. That JCI minimize the negative effect of currency fluctuations within the organization.
- 7. That the JCI Senatorship include five years of communication from JCI and that the fee be increased to US\$250. That this service be offered to all Senators for a subscription of US\$50.

Community Opportunities:

- 8. That every chapter be entitled to access and contribute to a JCI World Data Bank of projects conducted and concluded at all levels.
- 9. That the corporate identity of Junior Chamber and its impact in the community at all levels be enhanced. In this perspective, that a worldwide JCI competition be conducted to adopt a short definition of JCI and its Vision 2000.
- 10. That The Outstanding Young Persons of the World (TOYP) honorees receive their trophies from the JCI President at an event in their own countries.

International Opportunities:

- 11. That JCI, through the World President, be prepared to take a stand on issues related to the JCI Creed and to comment publicly on these issues.
- 12. That stronger cooperations between Africa and Europe, as well as within the Americas and the Caribbean, be developed and that the potential for extension in large territories in Asia be addressed.
- 13. That the JCI World Congress be condensed to five days in order to encourage maximum participation.

Business Opportunities:

- 14. That entrepreneurship be part of the JCI Mission.
- 15. That the International Business Network (IBN) become a worldwide electronic network of members registering for business activities at World Congresses and Area conferences.
- 16. That a code of ethics be established for business activities within Junior Chamber.
- 17. That strategic planning (including JCI Vision 2000) be encouraged at all levels.
